

Introduction & Study Approach

INTRODUCTION

Hartsfield–Jackson Atlanta International Airport (ATL or the Airport) is the world's busiest passenger airport, serving more than 103 million passengers annually. ATL is an engine for economic development across the southeastern United States. ATL triggers catalytic economic effects by:

- Operating as a job center of more than 63,000 jobs;
- Enabling business and travel tourism, enhancing the regional economy and hospitality industries;
- Serving as a freight gateway, supporting reliant goods producing industries throughout the Southeast; and
- Driving additional economic activity through supply chain effects and the spending of worker wages.


The Airport's influence is centered in Atlanta and Fulton County, but extends throughout Georgia and across neighboring states of Alabama, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. This study examines the fiscal year 2017 economic impact of ATL on three geographies:

- Metropolitan Atlanta, defined as the 28-county Atlanta-Sandy Springs-Marietta Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA)
- The State of Georgia, and
- The 355-county **Piedmont Atlantic Megaregion (PAM)**, which covers all or portions of six states.

Hartsfield–Jackson Atlanta International Airport is one of the most critical assets Atlanta and the Southeast have to facilitate global trade and investment while vastly growing jobs, income and corporate growth in our region.

The study also covers freight shipped through ATL from each state in the megaregion to domestic and international markets, extending the economic influence of businesses in these states across the nation and the globe.



In FY 2017, ATL generated **\$82.4 billion in revenue** in the Piedmont Atlantic Megaregion, supporting upwards of **448,000 jobs**. This includes nearly 313,000 jobs in the Atlanta MSA.

Flow of Economic Impacts

The ability of our associates to go virtually anywhere, anytime, nonstop, and the ease with which our global visitors can reach us, have dramatically increased the efficiency of our business. Summary of Impacts

The total economic contribution of ATL to the Piedmont Atlanta Megaregion is the sum of the business activity directly associated with ATL's operations and the spending of its users, as well as the additional business activity associated with orders to suppliers and respending of worker income.

In FY 2017, there were more than 63,000 direct jobs at ATL. Off-site business activities that depend directly on local air service for cargo deliveries or visitor spending by air passengers raised the direct airport impact to over 219,000 jobs in the PAM and produced \$46.9 billion in business sales.

Spin-off activities in the region (indirect and induced multiplier effects) are associated with goods and services purchased by the directly affected businesses and the respending of worker income in the region. Including these indirect and induced effects, the total economic role of ATL increases to approximately \$82.4 billion in business sales, including \$19.8 billion in personal income, and supports more than 448,000 jobs in the Southeast.

We are a regional tourism organization and Hartsfield–Jackson is critical to our continued success in hosting meetings and events within the southeastern United States and encouraging travel to our member states.




Air Cargo Shipped Through ATL

In 2017, ATL was the 14th busiest airport in the United States in terms of air cargo tonnage landed, and overall freight volumes at ATL have increased 37 percent since 2012.
